our Teaching and Learning Team, and continued work on Envisioning Our Future (five-year strategic planning), to the upcoming referendum driven building projects there is much to be excited about and get involved in!

How many ways can I express gratitude to all community members who are getting involved in the happenings in and around the district. We had a successful Envisioning Our Future event on Feb. 1 with about 100 participants learning and discussing the future path for the Pulaski Community School District! If you were unable to attend and would still like to participate or learn more about this, please contact me any time.

If you have been keeping track of district news via Pulaski News or through our monthly board meetings, you may have already heard our deep appreciation to this community for the support in the passing of both our operational and capital referendum! Your dedication to our school community spoke loud and clear and was heard by us all! Though it may seem quiet since the November

election time and passing of these referendums, we have been very busy in the work of moving forward.

Operational Referendum Update: The passage of the operational referendum allowed us to create a sustainable model for staff retention by making our wages market comparable. During the executive session of the January 25th board meeting, the Board of Education passed the recommended compensation model. All \$1.5 million have been allocated to salary and wages with 100 percent of our staff receiving an increase.

**Capital Referendum Update:** Within this Raider Report, you can specifically see a timeline of work for the building project. Throughout the projects we will have updates coming out to the community via our website and Pulaski News. Here is a little glimpse of what has been happening during this pre-construction phase!

What's New: The district began meeting with Bray Architects to further refine the needs identified during the referendum process. Focus groups have been created for each school to ensure the solutions meet the needs of both the administration and teachers. Recently, members of the District, along with teachers from Hillcrest, Sunnyside and Pulaski High School, toured several newly constructed schools in north and central Wisconsin to see the solutions they put in place, and to get their feedback

The Technology Department recently implemented Find me Printing for district staff.

#### What is Find Me Printing?

Find Me Printing allows users to add a document to a universal print queue within the network and then walk to

the nearest copier or whichever copier is convenient, tap their card and print the document!

It also eliminates those documents that get printed by mistake. You can simply select the job at the printer and delete it before ink ever hits the paper. With Find Me Printing, you can edit the document print options at the printer when you collect them.

Speaking of saving money, we all know that documents get sent to the printer accidentally, and sometimes you just don't have the time to get the document; it's just the way of life! When using Find Me Printing, your device will automatically delete the record after a specific time, freeing up the print queue and meaning that you'll reduce the amount of paper waste produced.

Another great feature of Find Me Printing is that documents are kept completely confidential. With the Find Me Printing System the document can only be released by the person who sent it to the printing device. Within the queue, documents are kept safe and secure so that no documents can be accessed without being authenticated by the document owner.

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
#### TEACHING AND LEARNING

The PCSD continues on the journey of our work to be Professional Learning Communities (PLCs). A Professional Learning Community (PLC) is an ongoing process in which schools/ districts work collaboratively in recurring cycles of **collective inquiry** and action research to achieve better results for the STUDENTS they serve. As shared previously in district newsletters, the work of the collaborative teams of teachers focuses on four critical questions centered around curriculum, assessment and instruction. The four critical questions include:

- What do we want students to know? (Curriculum: Universal Instruction)
- 2. How will we know when they know it? (Assessment)
- How will we support students who don't know it? (Instruction: Intervention)
- 4. How will we support students who already know it?
  (Instruction: Extension)

As educators, our work is focused on providing a guaranteed universal core instruction for all students. It shouldn't matter which school your child attends in the district or what teacher your child has; the power standards and learning targets should be the same for all students. We continue to focus on doing questions 1 (What do we want students to know? (Curriculum: Universal Instruction) and 2 (How will we know when they know it? (Assessment) really well for all students at high levels of learning.

However, we also know even before the pandemic there was a need to support students who weren't



proficient in certain skills and required interventions. This brings question #3 (How will we support students who don't know it?) to the forefront. Together as a district staff throughout the year, we have focused on Response to Intervention/ Instruction (RtI) or Multi-Leveled Systems of Support (MLSS) to provide levels or tiers of support. The diagram shows the two levels of support through Tier 2: Supplemental Programming and Tier 3: Intensive Programming to help support students who require interventions in specific power standard, learning targets, skills and will (both academic and behavioral).

We continue our work of providing systematic interventions and enrichment when needed for students who need a little more than the universal curriculum.

Please know that our 600-plus staff members are committed to the PCSD mission which is to provide all students the opportunity to achieve the knowledge and skills necessary to become contributing citizens in our diverse world.

It is our compelling vision that: "One Community: Everyone succeeds as they learn, grow, serve, and inspire the world."


It's exciting times across the Pulaski Community School District with the successful passing of the referendum.


While the planning and design work continues with Bray Architects and CD Smith daily, we are beginning to work on a more precise timeline on when certain projects will be completed.



savings. Some of the projects you will see completed this summer include:








- Pulaski High School fire system replacement and bathroom remodel

The Pulaski Community School District Student Services
Department focuses on ensuring success for all students ages
3-21 through providing holistic services that focus on social,
emotional, functional and academic skills.

We meet the individualized needs of each learner through the implementation of evidence-based practices including teaching strategies and providing comprehensive support for students and staff.

Student Services professionals are available in each of the seven schools within the Pulaski Community School District. More than 150 staff members including teachers, paraprofessionals, school counselors, nurses, therapists, English Language staff, school psychologists, educational interpreters, supportive diagnosticians, administrative assistants, school resource officers, Native American liaison and advocate, social worker and others work under the umbrella of Student Services.

The 2022-23 school year has been exciting as many students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) have been able to participate once again in community-based outings which is essential in the development of work and life skills. Additionally,

events such as the Valentine's Day Dance are returning to the Pulaski Community School District with several students and staff from surrounding school districts expected to participate.

The Student Services Department continues to focus on wellness for students and staff. Through providing a comprehensive school counseling curriculum at all schools along with offering small group and individualized therapeutic services, all student needs are able to be addressed. Additionally, staff participate in professional development activities focusing on wellness, compassion resilience, trauma informed care and other topi

## **Election ballot set**

The PCSD Board of Education has three seats up for election on April 4, two of which are contested.

Zone 2, which represents Chase, Little
Suamico and Morgan, will have incumbent
Alisa Anderson facing Dennis Kaminski.
Anderson has served on the board since being
appointed in September to fill the unexpired
seat of Jeromy Delebreau. Even though
Delebreau's seat didn't expire until 2024,
appointed board members must be voted in
at the next election to continue long term.

Zone 6, which represents Hobart and Oneida, will see incumbent Heidi Melzer opposed by Corey Juelich.

Michael Voelker, Zone 4 incumbent, filed non-candidacy papers in December. He has served on the board for 10 years. Jennifer Schwarz is running unopposed for the seat. Zone 4 represents Maple Grove and Lessor.

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#### TRANSPORTATION

There's a lot happening behind the scenes when it comes to making sure bus routes run smoothly during the winter. Our mechanics do a remarkable job making sure our yard is plowed, our buses are ready to go and our students are kept safe on the routes. And, be assured, bus drivers are doing everything possible to stay on schedule while maintaining safety as they



plow through snow-covered roads. Students need to dress warm while waiting or walking to the bus, because depending on road conditions, winter routes could run 10-20 minutes behind. We appreciate that driveways are kept cleared, especially for our white buses, which are required to pick up and drop off students in their driveway and not on the road.

**DRIVERS NEEDED:** Pulaski Community School District continues to experience a severe shortage for staffing bus drivers, just as most of our surrounding contractors and school districts are experiencing. What sets us apart is that Pulaski owns their school buses and also has their very own in-house CDL trainer. And it's all paid for by the district. Until we can find more drivers, buses will continue to be fuller and routes will be longer, so if you would like to know more about the position, or know someone that



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## PCSD exceeds expectations in DPI report card

Five of the Pulaski Community School District's seven schools received a four-star (exceeds expectations) ranking while the two others earned three-star (meets expectations) rankings in the state Department of Public Instruction's 2021-2022 School and District Report Cards. The PCSD as a whole was deemed to exceed expectations.

The DPI creates a report card for every publicly funded school and district in the state, which was released today. They are ranked from five stars (significantly exceeds expectations) to one star (fails to meet expectations). PCSD school results are as follows:

Receiving a four-star rating and exceeding expectations was: The Pulaski Community School District, Fairview Elementary School, Glenbrook Elementary School, Hillcrest Elementary School, Lannoye Elementary School, and Pulaski High School. Receiving three-star ratings and meeting expectations were: Sunnyside Elementary School, Pulaski Community Middle School.

Report cards are intended to help schools and districts use performance data to target improvement efforts to ensure students are ready for their next educational step, including the next grade level, graduation, and college or careers.

The report cards measure:

- Student achievement proficiency in reading and math on state assessments.
- Student growth measured by year-to-year improvements in achievement.
- Target group outcomes using information for students with the lowest test scores during the previous testing year (the target group) to compare their current year performance versus the non-target group population.
- On-track to graduation which shows how successfully students are achieving educational milestones that predict later success (attendance rates, graduation rates, etc.)
- Besides the star ratings, schools are assigned a score from 0 to 100 that is not a "percent correct" measurement but a formula that combines the four priority areas.

Those scores are: Hillcrest Elementary: 79.9, Lannoye Elementary: 78.4, Pulaski High School: 76.7, Glenbrook Elementary: 73.4, Fairview Elementary: 71.7, Pulaski Community Middle School: 68.1, Sunnyside Elementary: 66.8



PCSD had an overall score of 73.1 (Exceeds Expectations), which ranked the fourth highest in the Fox River Classic Conference.

"We are proud that overall the district exceeded expectations and almost all of our schools exceeded expectations or met expectations on the state report card used as accountability measures," said Jennifer Gracyalny, executive director of Teaching and Learning. "We realize this is only one measure of student achievement and must be triangulated with other state, district and classroom assessments to truly support and drive student learning in our classrooms. Our staff do an amazing job of utilizing evidence of learning and data to meet our student, curriculum and instruction needs."

The 2021-2022 report cards use data from a variety of sources, including information reported through WISEdash and three years of Forward testing as well as three years of ACT Plus Writing, ACT Aspire and Dynamic Learning Maps testing. Please note that testing was canceled for all but the ACT Plus Writing assessment in 2019-2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. In addition, test participation was impacted in both the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 testing seasons. As a result, DPI continues to caution the interpretation of scores and ratings due to the influence that the COVID-19 pandemic had on testing conditions during the years of testing included in these report cards.

# Improved bond rate means savings for taxpayers

The Pulaski Community School District's bond rating was recently upgraded by Moody's Investors Service to Aa2 from Aa3.

The improved rating, according to Moody's, was a reflection of the district's growing local economy, positive enrollment trends and strengthening financial reserve position that is expected to be maintained following voter authorization of an operational referendum.

A bond's rating reflects the likelihood that an issuing company will be able to pay off its debt.

Bond ratings earlier in the alphabet are considered better than those later in the alphabet, according to The Motley Fool website. From there, numbers or symbols further break down the letter-based rating. Moody's uses numbers to indicate relative quality, with Aa1 being the best Aa rating, followed by Aa2 and Aa3.

While that might seem convoluted, what taxpayers need to know is this: The district was able to secure a lower interest rate when it sold general obligation bonds on Jan. 24 for the \$69.8 million building projects that were approved by voters in a November 2022 referendum.

Prior to the referendum, the district projected an interest rate of 4.75 percent to 5 percent. Instead, when the district locked in financing on Jan. 24, it was able to secure an interest rate of 3.7 percent. The Board of Education previously gave Allison Space, superintendent, and Heidi Melzer, School Board president, the permission to lock in financing when the fluctuating bond market was at an advantageous point in regard to interest rates.

That will save the district more than \$10.3 million in interest payments over the life of the financing. But that's

not all. That lowers the average mill rate that taxpayers will pay for the building project over the payback period from \$1.28 per \$1,000 assessed value mill rate projected prior to the referendum to \$1.04 per \$1,000 assessed. That means, a property owner with a home valued at \$100,000 would pay \$104 instead of \$128. The owner of a home valued at \$200,000 would pay \$208 instead of \$256.

"It is a big deal," said board member Michael Voelker. "It really points to our fiscal responsibility and the timing of this, too. It's great, as good as you could possibly hope for."

"And Moody's doesn't just give out increases in the ratings like candy," said board member Barb McKeefry.

Logan said such rating improvements are rare and are the result of an in-depth and intense look at district financials by Moody's. In fact, at the Jan. 25 Board of Education meeting, Logan said he had never previously seen a bond rating improvement at a district where he worked.

**PROJECT UPDATE:** Space noted at the Jan. 25 board meeting that a flurry of activity is happening in what is called a pre-construction planning phase. School administrators have visited other schools that have been recently built or remodeled to gather information to best fine-tune building plans. Regular communication between district administrators and Bray Architects and contractor C.D. Smith. is occurring during this planning phase.

Most of the work will take place at Sunnyside Elementary, Hillcrest Elementary, and Pulaski High School; however, all buildings will receive updates and improvements to major building systems and improved site safety. The preliminary schedule calls for the improvements to start in the spring of 2024.



BAND, CHOIR TO PASADENA: The Pulaski Red Raider marching band and PHS choir have been chosen to perform in the 2024 Tournment of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California. The band has performed at this event in years prior, but this time the PHS choir also gets to show its talents alongside them. The PHS choir was recommended for the event from their past performances at Carnegie Hall and Disney World. The band has been preparing since February 2022, organizing rehearsals to practice their music and choreography. In the months leading up to audition day, they rehearsed two nights a week, every week, marching in the ever-changing Wisconsin weather. They recorded their audition video in the PHS parking lot on May 8. The band will have about 200 marchers from ninth to 12th grade and the choir will have performers from eighth to 12th grade as well.

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80 YEARS OF PULASKI NEWS: Pulaski area residents have now received student-produced information via the Pulaski News for 80 years. The newspaper holds the title of being the longest-running community newspaper produced by students in the nation. Over the past eight decades, many student editors, reporters, photographers, ad sales representatives and more received practical training while helping disseminate information to area residents. The Pulaski News dates back to the Pulaski HI - NEWS and the Tricopa (tri-county paper) in 1938. However, in August 1942, the start of the Pulaski News produced by high school students was heartily received by the community. The first few weeks, 1,800 papers were printed.

FFA HONORS BAND: PHS senior Emily Skala recently performed with the National FFA Honors band on bass clarinet. To be eligible, she had to be a second year in the state band, and show her abilities through a chromatic scale and solo audition. Her FFA advisor was also a part of the process, helping to fill out paperwork. This ensemble takes roughly 80 students, and performs at the National FFA Convention sponsored by Corteva Agriscience. Previously, she earned a spot on the State FFA Honors Band. Skala earned a seat as the only bass clarinet among 70 musicians this year.

SCHOLARSHIPS: One Pulaski High School student was named a semi-finalist in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program. Additionally, three others have been named as Commended students. Jonathon Hanson, Sobieski, is a semifinalist in the National Merit Scholarship Program (NMSP) while Charles Duffrin, Oneida; Aiden Mikulsky, Sobieski; and Jack Ryan, Oneida, were named Commended students.

**FRANCE TRIP:** The PHS French Club will travel to France this summer, exactly 10 years since the last trip in 2013. The club will leave for France on June 16 and will stay in the country for 15 days — exploring the outskirts of France as well as favorite tourist attractions in Paris.

#### A CENTURY OF YEARBOOKS:

One-hundred years of student-led yearbooks is happening this school year. "This yearbook doesn't just represent who's working on it today, but 100 years of students who worked on it before," stated yearbook officer Alyssa Spates. The Yearbook Club meets at PHS each Wednesday during homeroom in Aaron Sperduto's classroom. Sperduto has been assisting the yearbook staff for the past 16 years. Twenty-three staff members are capturing the moments this year at PHS for the 2022-23 yearbook.

MUSIC ACHIEVEMENTS: The WSMA State Honors Band and Choir took place on Oct. 28, 2022, and PHS had seven individuals chosen to take part in this opportunity. The individuals who were selected were seniors: Callie Widi, Madeline Diefenthaler, Janelle Erickson, Audryn Just, and Timothy Huber, and sophomores: Olivia Hodge and Kaden Brown. Widi was also recently selected to perform with the National Association for Music Education concert band program in Maryland. Widi has played tuba for seven years and made nationals three years in a row, though two of those years were virtual due to lock-down restrictions. This year, nationals were at the Gaylord Convention Center in National Harbor Nov. 3-6, 2022.

**NEW CLUBS:** Pulaski High School has two new clubs. The first is dedicated to teaching American Sign Language. The club is being led by Pulaski High School senior Breann Hodge and is being advised by social studies teacher Paula Krause. Hope Squad is a Pulaski High School club that focuses on peer suicide prevention. The program runs across the United States. It was created in Utah after that state experienced a spike in teenage suicides. Julie Harris, PCSD director of Student Services. introduced the idea for the Pulaski Community School District. Program advisers are Brianna Karcz, Jeff Waggoner, Leah Grant, Shelby Kaisershot, Carly Cerrato and Mallory Lichon. Hope Squad members are from grades 9 to 12, and 39 members are in the program. At the beginning of the year, students nominated three students to be a part of Hope Squad. They selected students that they feel comfortable talking to and that they can trust.


